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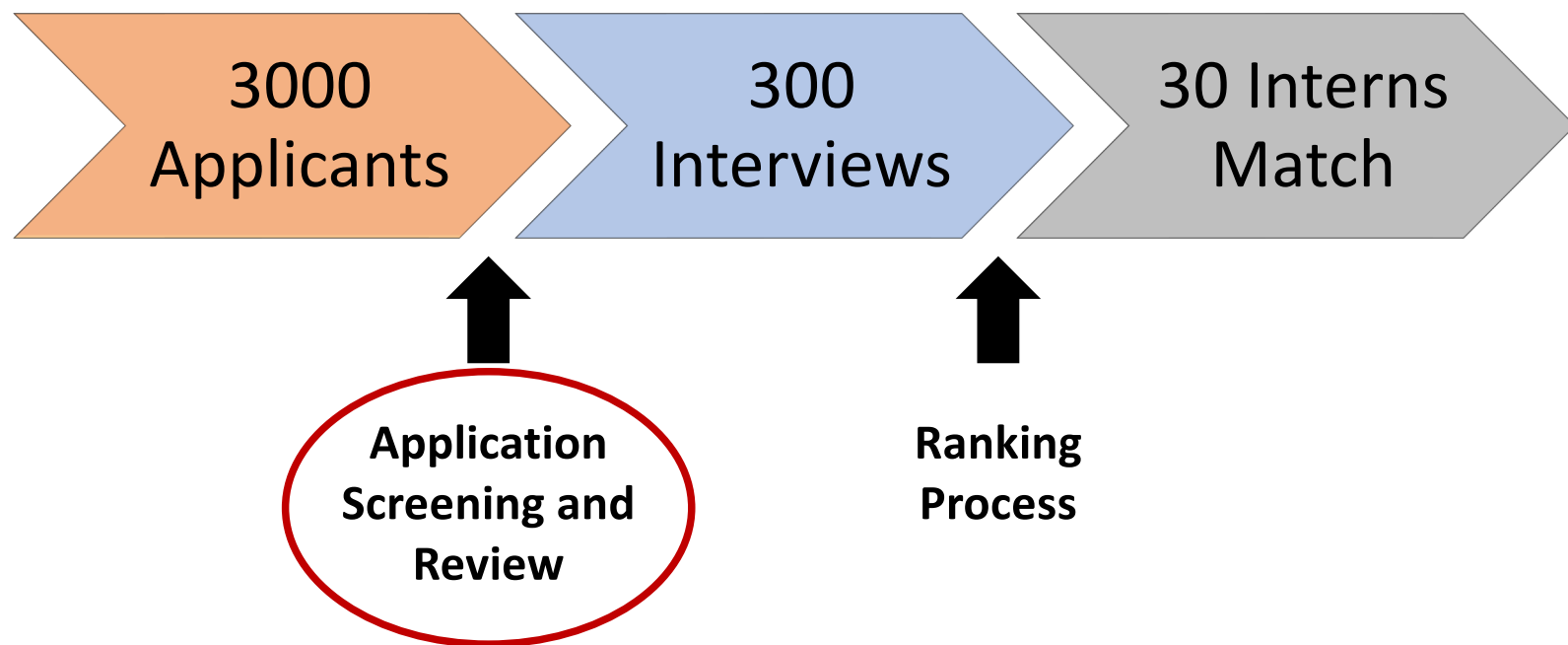

AAMC Survey on Supplemental Application

In 2021-22 Match Cycle:

- 361/566 of categorical IM programs participated in the supplemental application (64%)
- 15,486/18,986 of categorical IM applicants completed the supplemental application (82%)

How did PDs use the Supplemental Application?

- ▶ Holistic, initial application review (85%-95%)
- ▶ Help decide whom to interview (81%-95%)
- ▶ Interview preparation (64%-74%)
- ▶ Stimulate questions during interview (57%-72%)

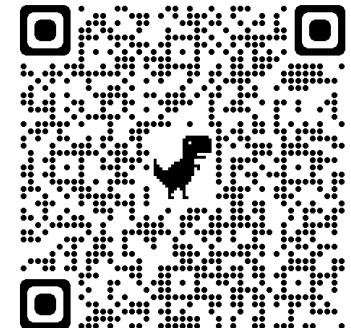

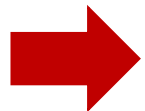
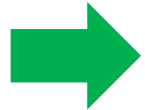

Sept. 14, 2022, at 11:59 p.m. ET	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Deadline for applicants to register an ERAS token to receive an invitation to the supplemental application.
Sept. 16, 2022, at 5 p.m. ET	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Deadline for applicants to submit the supplemental ERAS application.• Supplemental ERAS application closes.
Sept. 28, 2022	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Program Director Work Station (PDWS) opens to programs.• Supplemental ERAS application data available to programs along with all other ERAS data in the PDWS.

Meaningful Experience Essay Tips

Reflect	Why was the experience meaningful, how has it influenced you, and what you will bring to residency because of it?
Weave	Weave in the focus areas or characteristic you tagged.
Don't List	Do not just list what you did or the set of skills developed.
Be Succinct	Note the 300-character limit.
Summarize	Focus information and avoid extraneous info.

Other Impactful Experiences Essay

Please describe any challenges or hardships that influenced your journey to residency. This could include experiences related to family background, financial background, community setting, educational experiences, and/or general life experiences: *(750-character limit)*

Meant to capture information not otherwise described in PS, MSPE, LORs, CV, etc.

Additional opportunity to demonstrate determination and resilience

PDs do not expect all applicants to reply to this question

30% of applicants did not reply in 2022 cycle.

Other Impactful Experience Essay

Family Background

- First generation to college

Financial Background

- Worked to support family growing up

Community Setting

- Food scarcity
- Lack of access to medical care

Educational Experiences

- Limited access to advisors/mentors

Other General Life Circumstances

- Loss of a family member
- Serving as a caregiver while working or in school



Additional insight and context

Meaningful Experience Tags

Paint a picture of an applicant...

What is important to them?

What specific qualities do they bring to residency?

Meaningful Experience Essay

Tell a story about each applicant...

Why was the experience meaningful?

How did it influence them?

Other Impactful Life Experience(s) Essay

Provide context to the application...

What other impactful experiences have they encountered or overcome on their journey to residency?

What's the difference between personal statement and past experiences?

Personal Statement

- Why this specialty
- Your fit for the specialty
- What will make you successful

Past Experiences

- Who are you
- What will you bring to a residency program
- What is most important to YOU
- Allows elaboration on the characteristic area that you tagged



Geographic Preferences

Goals:

- Provide an opportunity to share preferences for regions and location setting
- Communicate the importance of geography for an applicant

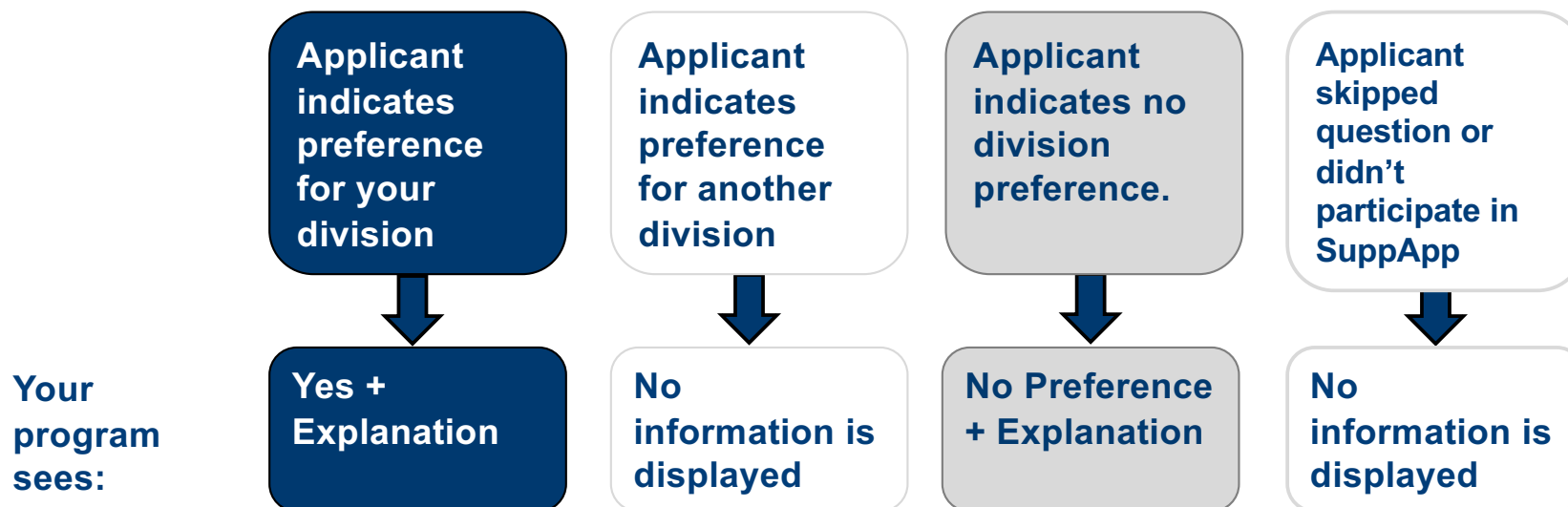

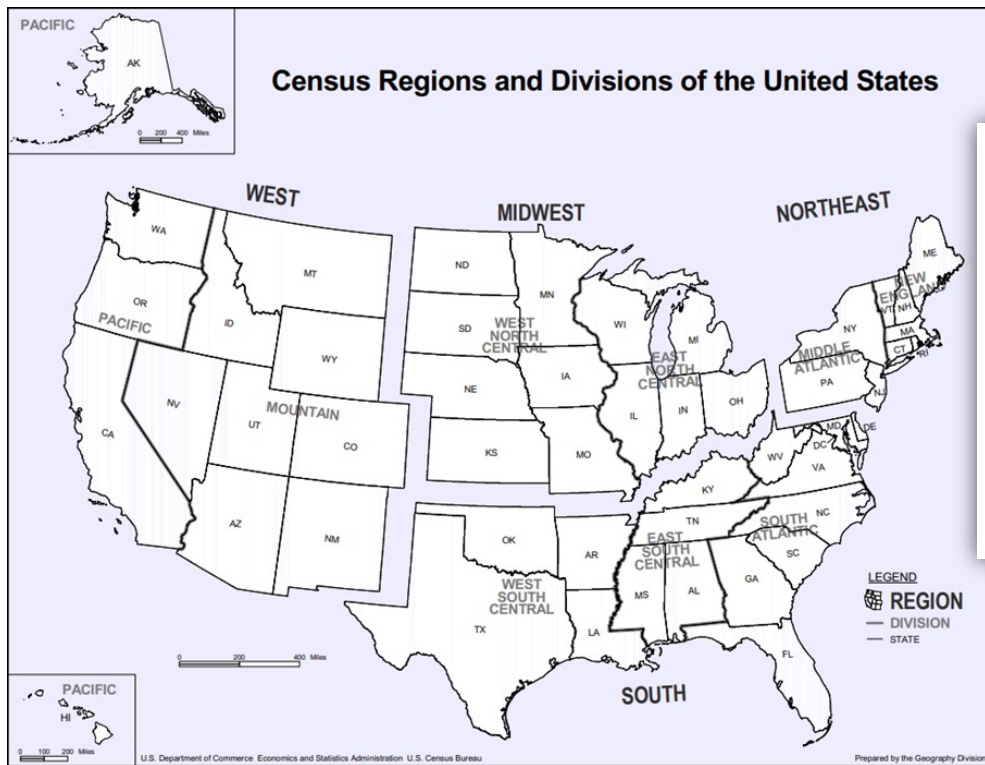

70% of programs used geographic preferences during the application process

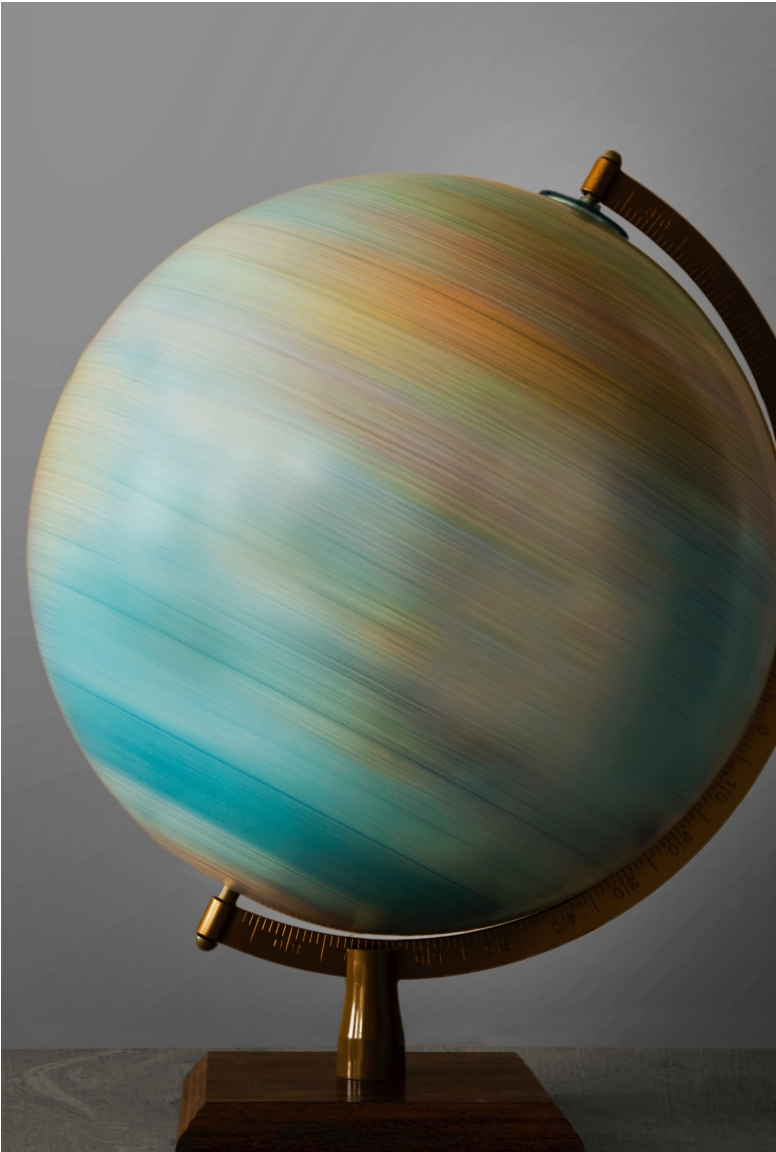


~60% of respondents agreed the geographic preference information helped their program identify applicants they would have otherwise overlooked.



~30% of respondents agreed applicants who stated a preference for their region were more likely to accept interview invitations.

Geographic Preferences: Use by Programs



Geographic Preferences

Screen before application review (87%)

To help decide whom to interview (88%)

Tiebreaker when deciding whom to interview (86%),

To send interview invitations **to every applicant who selected their program** (74%)

To prepare for the interview (56%)

To stimulate questions during the interview (51%)

Preference Signaling

2023 Preference Signaling for IM Programs

- ▶ Helps convey genuine interest in a program
- ▶ 7 IM program signals
- ▶ No signal order or “double signals”
- ▶ Programs do not see whether you participated, only if you signaled them



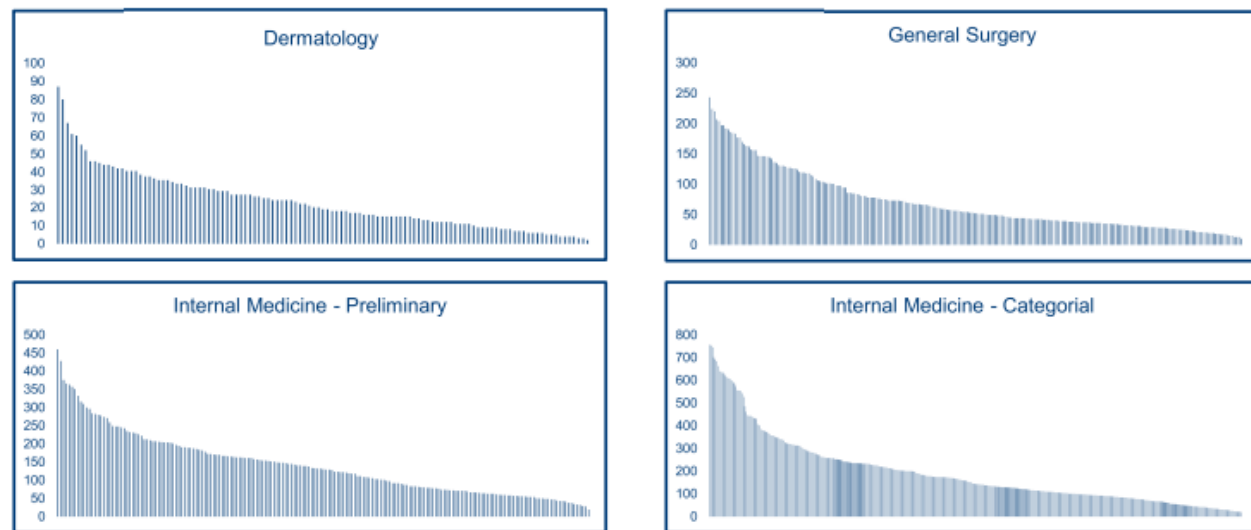
Program Preference Signaling: PD Perspectives

89% (93) of IM PDs responding to AAMC survey used preference signaling

- ▶ 88% as a **screening tool** before application review
 - ▶ 82% sent **interview invites to every applicant** that selected their program
 - ▶ 96% as a part of a **holistic process** to help decide who to interview
 - ▶ 88% as a **tie breaker** when deciding who to interview
-
- ▶ 82% stated signals helped identify applicants they would have otherwise overlooked
 - ▶ Survey did not ask if/how this influenced development of rank lists

Preference Signaling

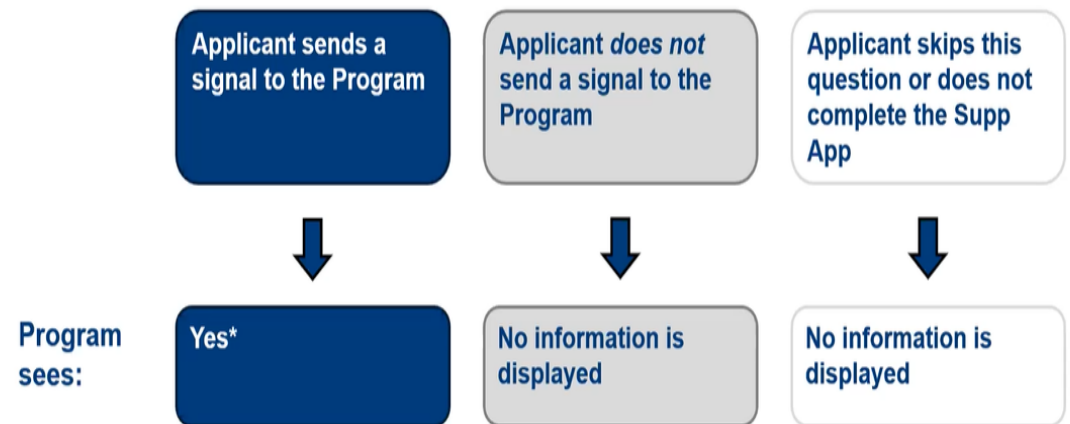
Distribution of Preference Signals by Program 2022 Match Cycle



25% of IM Categorical Programs received 53% of all signals sent

Q: Is there any downside to program signaling?

- ▷ Applicants can choose not to signal but **there is NO benefit in not signaling.**
- ▷ Programs only see **whether or not an applicant signaled their program.**
- ▷ Programs **do NOT know the number of signals used or where a student sent them.**
- ▷ **USE ALL SIGNALS!!!**



Q: Are there strategies for using signals effectively ?

- ▶ Preference signals intended to **facilitate interviews only**, not ranking.
- ▶ Applicants should consider their **application strength, career goals, and personal circumstances**, as well as the relative **competitiveness, mission, and goals** of the residency programs to which they apply.
- ▶ Signals may be **especially useful** for a program that is a good match for a student's application, but for which the student's interest may not be readily apparent (ex. geographical area is far away).
- ▶ **IM applicants should not signal their home institutions or institutions where they completed away rotations.**
 - Many (but not all) institutions offer interviews to their own students and to students who successfully completed visiting rotations.



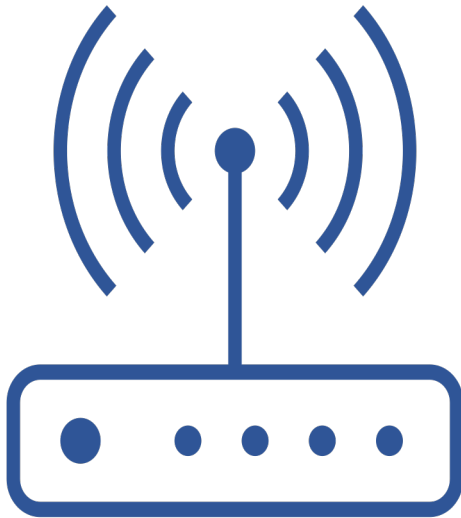


What are reliable resources to help with program selection?

Q: What if a student is applying to 2 specialties?

- ▷ All programs in **both** specialties see the **same** past experiences sections and the **same** geographical and urban/rural preferences.
- ▷ Applicant have separate signals to use for each specialty.
- ▷ Example:
 - A student applying to IM & EM residencies completes **one supplemental application**.
 - **Both IM & EM residency programs** see the **same** meaningful/impactful life experience information/essays and geographical preferences.
 - The student has **7 signals for IM** programs and **5 signals for EM** programs.

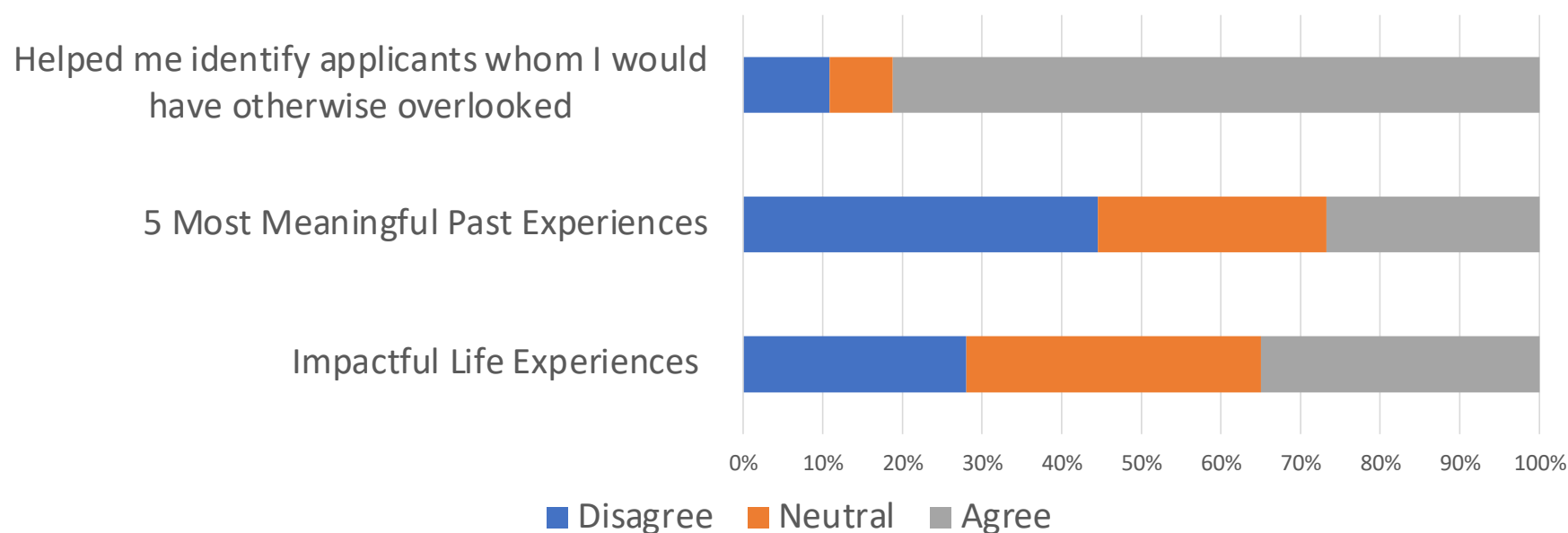
Program Signaling Take Home Points



- ▶ **Use the signals!!!**
- ▶ Students should signal programs they have **strong interest** in, especially if interest might not readily come across in the application.
- ▶ Signaling highly competitive programs at which a student would otherwise be unlikely to get an interview may be **low yield**.
- ▶ Ensure students only signal programs that are **participating** in the supplemental app!
